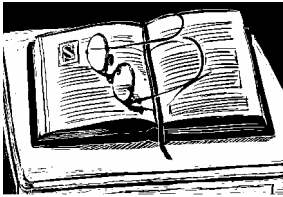

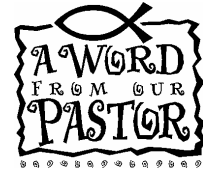

The Tattler

For several weeks now I have coped with an unintended consequence of our new roof, namely, the inability to make or receive cell phone calls due to the “shield” of steel over our building! In order to get good cell phone reception, I must step outside the church and make my calls from the sidewalk. Doing so reminds me of the provocative question Barbara Brown Taylor asks in her book, *Leaving Church*, which Linda Britton helpfully reviewed in last month’s issue of *The ROCK*: *What if the church’s job were to move people out the door instead of trying to keep them in, by convincing them that God needed them more in the world than in the church?*

That question has real implications for Epiphany, the season of the church year that follows immediately after Christmas and features the visit of the magi to the manger. These travelers from the East are worldly wise, enlightened outsiders, who look for signs of God’s appearing all around them. They seek and find God *beyond* the familiar boundaries of traditional faith and the established church. Their journey to the manger and then back home again confirms the Epiphany prayer found in our *Book of Common Worship*: “*O Christ, Savior and Lord, extend your church to every place. Make it a place of welcome for people of every race and tongue.*”

Like their worldly counterparts, the shepherds, the wise men leave the manger to witness to Christ’s reign in every place, including muddy fields full of grazing sheep and magnificent palaces where sages testify to the truth that “brighter visions beam afar.” Such a wide ranging mission field invites us to consider how God calls us beyond the doors of this church and encourages our witness wherever we go after we exit the church. Listening and responding to God in the pew may simply be the prelude to meeting God on the sidewalk and serving God in the world each of us inhabits six days a week.

So, if you see me standing on the sidewalk talking on my cell-phone, it may have nothing to do with poor reception caused by our new roof. That’s because the sidewalk and where it leads may very well be the best place of all for me to hear and answer God’s call to “*Get out there and get on with it!*”—all for the sake of our Savior and Lord whose church extends to every place!

TIME FOR PEACE.....

I noticed this year that many of the Christmas cards were about peace. Hopefully this is a sign that people are looking for peace in the world and in their lives. How can we share the gift of Peace? The Silent Unity Ministry suggests that we can unite with others in creating a beacon of Peace that illuminates the world. Inspiring lights, whether in the form of a glowing candle, festive fireworks or natures' awesome Northern Lights leave vivid impressions in the mind. The light that is indelible is a beacon of peace. As we let our lights shine, uniting with the light of others, peace in the world grows as the peace within each individual shines out to eliminate any darkness of distrust and conflict. Peaceful God-inspired words and actions unite families, friends, neighborhood, communities and countries. Harmony and goodwill reign, rendering borders and differences unimportant. What is important is that person after person is responding as a beacon of peace which merges into one light that illumines the world with peace. "Let our light shine before others so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." Mathew 5:16.

Another way we can share the gift of peace is to contribute to nonviolence. Some ways to do this are: to honor the dignity and inherent worth of every human being, believing that our lives are linked together, that what we do impacts the lives of other people, so we are responsible to and for one another, dedicating ourselves to the fundamental rights of every human being (justice, equity, equality), using our talents to empower others as well as ourselves, courageously choosing to practice compassion with our apparent adversaries. We oppose injustice, not people. Thus we recognize the power of the human spirit to triumph over injustice, social inequity and suffering. This is the hero's journey (from Principles of Nonviolence). Nonviolence would help significantly in promoting peace in our world.

A recent Prayer of Confession tells us "Lord Jesus Christ, you said to your apostles, "peace I leave with you, may peace I give to you". Forgive our lack of faith in your work and your purposes. Challenge our cynical assumptions that war and hunger are inevitable and peace unattainable. Shake us out of our complacency and easy accommodation of the status quo. Unseat the fears that rule our hearts and replace them with an awesome reverence for your holy name. With our trust rightly placed in you, we will dare to do the work of peace and justice to which your kingdom calls".

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS.....



December 12, 2006

It was M/S/C to approve the Treasurer's Report. Bill Moehle noted that the pace of 2006 pledge receipts was good, and if continued through December would approximate goals.

Trustee MaryEllen Weissinger provided an update on the Capital Campaign Feasibility Study and campaign planning. She reported that at a meeting with the campaign consultant, Ana Lugo, an event calendar was established, including informational meetings and identifying 20 potential interview candidates such as church leaders and key potential donors. It now appears that the official campaign would be launched in Fall 2007.

Elder Bob Trujillo introduced a proposal for RPC's First Annual "Time and Talent Fair", tentatively scheduled for January 21st. Committee responsibilities for the Fair were discussed. Each committee is to be prepared to present Fair participation plans at the January Session meeting.

It was M/S/C to hold the Annual Meeting of the Congregation on January 28, 2007.

Elders Bill Carson and Tom Milsap, Commissioners, reported on the December 5, 2006 Presbytery Meeting at Pineda Presbyterian Church.

RPC Congregational Meeting Information

The Rockledge Presbyterian Church Congregational Meeting was held on Sunday, December 10th, 2006 after the 11:00a.m. Worship Service. The purpose of the meeting was to present the 2007 Proposed Budget to the Congregation. The 2007 Proposed Budget was previously approved by Session on November 14th, 2006.

Below are the questions that were asked by various church members and the answer(s) from the appropriate RPC Committee.

Question #1 - Is it realistic not to consider an increase for insurance in 2007 considering the current insurance market?

Answer by Corporate Administration Committee Chairperson Bob Trujillo:

This is a very appropriate concern with the ever escalating cost of insurance in Florida. But, with our new roof installation, the Church Mutual Insurance Company has no plans to increase the RPC costs for insurance during 2007. The new Church roof is constructed of materials that meet the higher building standards for hurricane protection.

Question #2 – Under Nursery staff expenses, I would like to know more details?

Answer by Church Treasurer Bill Moehle:

We have two employees on the Nursery Staff. Anita Waddington has been serving our nursery for many years. She is paid \$10.00 per hour. Kiley Workman, a High School Senior, replaced Laura Bradford when Laura left to attend College in September. Kiley is paid \$7.50 per hour.

Question #3 - Why are we not funding more camp experiences for the younger children?

Answer by CE/Youth Committee Chairperson Kim Workman:

We have not had an adult that wanted to be in charge of doing camps and weekend trips. The Burley family has volunteered to take that on and we are very happy that the younger children will have other things to look forward to other than Kids night and the Christmas play.

Question #4 - Why are we continuing to pay for transportation to Montreat? Are we also still contributing 1/3 of Montreat trip? Transportation should be included in cost of trip to youth attending.

Answer by CE/Youth Committee Chairperson Kim Workman:

The amount of money that we have put in the CE budget for transportation will go to cover some of the transportation costs to Montreat. We have budgeted money for transportation, and for camps. The money is not all for Montreat. We are planning on funding some of our budget for a camp for Middle school children, as well as funding for the 4th-6th grade mini break (they are planning something as a group but I am not sure at this time if it will be a camp, they are talking about a mini break to St Augustine). The CE committee speaks about what we are doing and what we are funding every month. Every member has a voice in what we do and what we fund. We would love to have more members join the CE committee.

NOTE: Thank you to all church members attending the Congregational Meeting on December 10th. Our Church members providing feedback to Session is a very important part of the 2007 RPC Budget process. As more Church Members pledge, the RPC 2007 Budget will be adjusted accordingly.

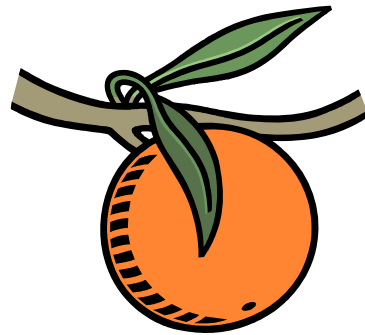

Did you know that each year the USDA estimates that 96 billion pounds of food go to waste in the fields of America's farms? And about 36 million Americans suffer from hunger? The Society of St. Andrew was created to help alleviate hunger by collecting (or gleaning) fruits and vegetables before they are plowed under and then getting the food to those who need it.

On January 20th, our church will participate in its first gleaning. Middle and High School youth and adults are invited to lend a hand. All you have to be willing and able to do is pick citrus fruit, box it up, or load/unload it.

We will meet at the church at 7:30 a.m. to leave for Titusville where we will begin with breakfast and instructions at the First United Methodist Church. We'll then go to a grove where we'll pick the fruit that was left over after harvest. We'll box it and transport it back to the church where we will load it on to trucks for shipment to local food banks for distribution to the hungry. We will be finished by noon if not before. Anyone with a van or pick-up is asked to drive so we can transport the fruit that we pick.

STEWARDSHIP 2007.....

New Tax-Free IRA Gift Opportunity

New Federal Law Allows Tax-Free Charitable Transfers from IRAs

A provision in the Pension Protection Act of 2006 creates a new opportunity: transferring Individual Retirement Account (IRA) assets directly to a qualified charitable organization such as Rockledge Presbyterian Church without paying income tax. The law covers all gifts made in the tax years 2006 and 2007. This is an ideal opportunity to share the wealth of your retirement savings by using IRA assets to make a significant gift to Rockledge Presbyterian Church

How does this new gift option work?

- You must be age 70½ at the time the distribution is made.
- You may contribute up to \$100,000 per person. A married couple is eligible for up to \$200,000.
- The gift must be made on or before December 31, 2007.
- The funds must be transferred directly from a traditional IRA to Rockledge Presbyterian Church.
- As the distribution is not included in your gross income, the IRA rollover does not provide a charitable income-tax deduction.

How can you make such a gift?

- Notify the financial institution that manages your IRA account and direct them to transfer a gift directly to Rockledge Presbyterian Church.
- Notify our Rockledge Presbyterian Church office that your gift is coming with more information about the financial institution making the transfer.

As with any estate or financial planning decision, please consult your professional advisors before proceeding.

STEWARDSHIP 2007

What Presbyterians Believe

Stewardship is a spiritual matter not a code word for raising money!

One of the curious things about Presbyterians and stewardship is that those who have the least tend to give the most. Percentage-wise more people with incomes of less than \$25,000 tithe (give 10 percent) than those with a greater income. The same is true of the way they give their time and talents to the church.

Christian living involves Christian giving!

Perhaps it is because they have learned one of the great theological and Biblical truths that Malachi taught the Hebrew people about the reward of the faithful: "Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, so that there may be food in my house, and thus put me to the test, . . . see if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you an overflowing blessing" (3:10).

This is not a gospel of prosperity, but an illustration of who receives the greater benefit, the giver or the receiver. We discover the joy of giving when we discover that stewardship is everything we do from the moment we confess Jesus Christ as Lord. Those who exhibit exemplary stewardship have made this an intensively spiritual matter.

A poor church is not one without money, but one without a vision. When people have a clear Biblical and theological understanding of the mission of the church, healthy stewardship practices emerge. The New Testament church leaders discovered that stewardship did not come naturally; it was a learned discipline. Paul wrote to his young colleague Timothy to teach the people in Ephesus that "there is great gain in godliness combined with contentment; for we brought nothing into the world, so that we can take nothing out of it" (1 Timothy 6:6-7). We might say it this way: we make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give away.

If we believe that the mission of the church is to "make disciples," to teach people to obey the commandments of Christ, we have to remember that Jesus also said: "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. . . . For what will it profit them if they gain the whole world but forfeit their life?" (Matthew 16:24-26). Exciting things are happening in many Presbyterian churches today as they put a new emphasis on stewardship in its fullest dimension--which includes a person's time, talent and treasures (financial resources). More and more congregations have begun to talk about tithing time, talent and treasures. They are emphasizing that Christian living necessarily involves Christian giving.

Where there is a vibrant, exciting church, that congregation has made stewardship a spiritual matter. For those Presbyterians stewardship has to do with how they live and their daily commitments to Jesus Christ as their Lord. I once heard a pastor say, "When you give only your money, you give very little; it is when you give of yourself that you truly give."

The good news about Presbyterians and their stewardship of time, talent and treasure is that when authentic mission needs are presented, many respond generously. But more and more congregations are discovering that the Sunday morning offerings are inadequate to meet the growing mission needs in the world. Their solution is to invite people to give to a permanent endowment fund for the ministry of the church. These can be gifts over and above an annual pledge and can be given during a person's lifetime or through a bequest in a will.

The mission and ministry of Presbyterian congregations would be vastly more significant if every member tithed and if every member left a tithe of their estate to the church.
